THE SCHOOL CURRICULUM

The school operates a 2-week timetable with 49 hours of lessons being taught over the two weeks. Unlike at primary school, your child will most likely have a different teacher for each subject.

TEACHING GROUPS

Pupils are taught in broad general ability bands in most subjects, for which we consider the available prior attainment data balanced with conversations with our primary school staff.

Pupils are set separately in English and so, for example, may be in Y1 for English, and Z1 for all other subjects. In Maths pupils will be placed in sets 1—9 depending on ability.

The bands which the children are placed in are determined by the Key Stage Two test results.

At the end of the Autumn and Summer terms, staff in each subject area meet to discuss the progress of all children. At these meetings decisions to move children up or down bands will be made to enable children to work within a group which is best suited to their ability. Both children and parents will be informed about these decisions before the end of the term.

Pupils are also placed into one of nine form groups named after local saints. These groups are used for registration and for inter-form competitions.

CLUBS AND ACTIVITIES

The extended curriculum includes a whole range of clubs and activities which take place at lunchtime and after school. All children are encouraged to join at least one of these clubs where they can meet others who have similar interests. A list of days and times of the clubs are put up in all form rooms and if needed early dinner passes can be obtained from the teacher in charge. Each term, we hold an extra-curricular fair during lunch. Here pupils can sign up to the clubs and activities. All of the available extra-curricular programmes are also advertised in our 'Club News' which is published in the school newsletter. Pupils will receive reward points for attending.

HOME LEARNING

Year 7 pupils are expected to do forty-five minutes to one hour of home learning each evening. A separate home learning timetable is issued in September. Home learning is recorded in a home learning diary provided by the school on the first day of term. Pupils are encouraged to record all home learning in their diaries and to do it on the night it is set, when it is fresh in their minds. School models the weekly homework pattern using a home learning timetables, these can be found [HERE](#)

In the diary there is a place to tick when they have completed the home learning and to record when it is due to be handed in. We ask that parents check their child's home learning diary and sign it each week to say they have seen it. The child's form teacher will also check the diaries as often as possible to see that they are being used correctly.

Home Learning is used to reinforce learning in the classroom, as well as giving pupils the opportunity for independent learning and to develop research skills. Pupils who spend time on their home learning always do well in school. There is a Study club which runs at lunchtime each day.

Home learning is often set using Microsoft Teams and SharePoint. Pupils will all be given an email address and thorough instructions on how to access the platforms during their first week.

If you have any concerns about home learning please phone school and speak to the curriculum leader for that subject or your child's Year Leader.

Parents will be able to monitor the weekly points total for behaviour and rewards in the pupils' planners or online using tracking system, Talaxy.



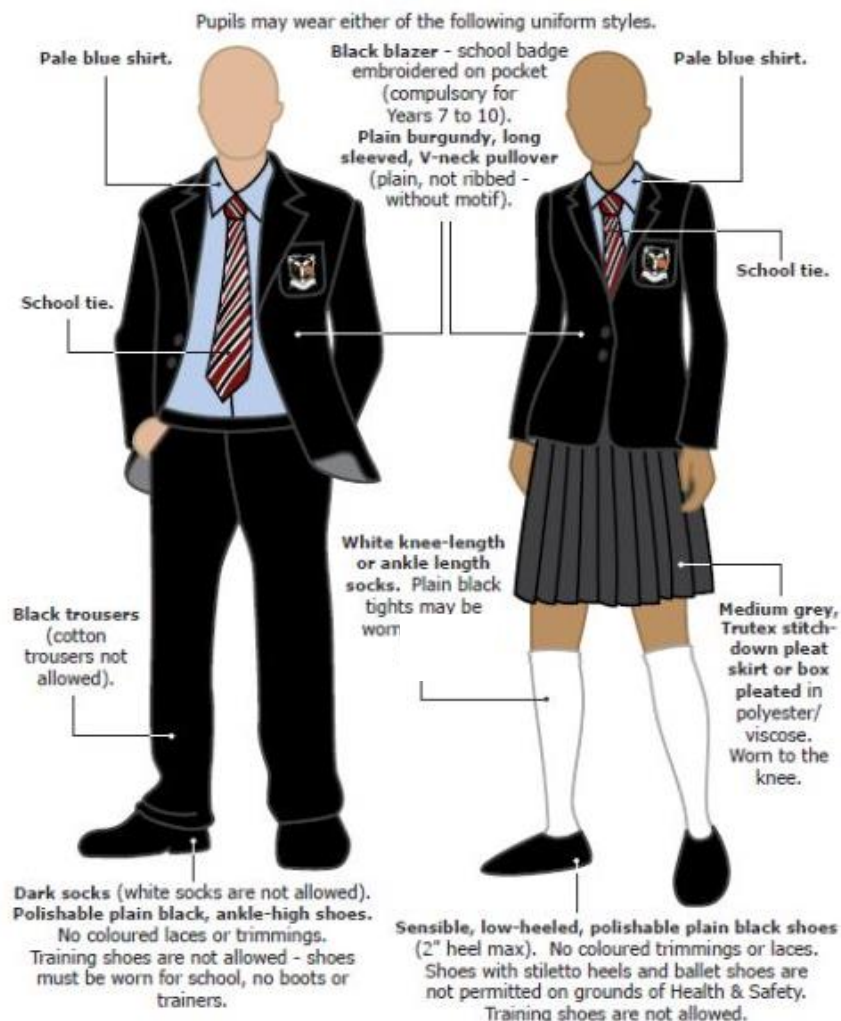
SCHOOL UNIFORM

We want pupils to look smart and create a good impression, therefore, school uniform is compulsory and must be worn correctly. Parents can view our uniform policy online, this highlights the rules about hairstyles jewellery etc.

All pupils are issued with a uniform card which is used to mark any discrepancies. If a uniform card is marked three times in a half-term, a 30 minute after school detention will be sanctioned.

It is important that all uniform is fully labelled so that lost items can be returned to their owners. In particular P.E. kits are often left around the school or on the bus and can only be reunited with their owners if they are named.

There are times such as non-uniform days and retreat day when pupils can wear their own clothes. There are clear guidelines given to children before these events about appropriate dress.

Application of the C System

REWARDS

Pupils at St. Augustine's work very hard throughout the school year. During each term we give one child from each class a certificate for excellent work in each of the subjects studied.

Throughout the school reward points are also given to pupils who produce excellent classwork or home learning or who contribute to the extra-curricular life of the school. Our whole school rewards system means that pupils can exchange their reward points each term for items of school stationery or school vouchers. Pupils do so by completing the online form available on Pupil SharePoint. All pupils who have collected 30 reward points in a term are entered into a prize draw.

USEFUL EQUIPMENT

Your child will need the following items for their lessons. Some of these can be purchased from school either on Intake Evening or at the start of term from the relevant department or from pupil support.

- Writing equipment; Pens (Black or Blue plus Green), pencils, rubber, ruler, pencil sharpener, coloured pencils
- Glue stick, scissors, highlighters
- Calculator and geometry set (available from the Maths department)
- P.E. Kit, trainers
- Homework planner
- Reading book (from home or library)
- Good News Bible
- Technology apron (plain blue – available from Amazon)
- Sturdy bag for books
- Headphones (2.5mm mini jack connection) – can be purchased from Pupil Services

Please ensure your child is bringing the writing equipment they need by regularly checking and replacing missing or used up items. Learning Support and Pupil Services have basic stationery for sale.

DINNER MONEY AND BUS SERVICES

Each day pupils choosing to purchase a lunch from school will need dinner money adding to their Scopay accounts. This can be done in two ways; by the pupil using the coin facilities in school to manually on the funds onto their accounts, or by parents electronically adding the funds via Scopay. A link to set up the online account will be sent to all families before pupils start with us.

COMMUNICATION BETWEEN SCHOOL AND HOME

School tries to adopt a 'paperless' approach where possible, it is extremely important that we have the correct email address for you.

During the year you will receive or be able to view online:

- A 'Dates for your diary' letter
- Dates of all the school holidays for the year
- A school newsletter is sent via Talaxy every fortnight
- Policy documents about uniform, discipline, bullying etc. (available on the school website or can be printed upon request)
- A Christmas and Easter assessment informing you about your child's efforts and attainment in each subject
- Letters informing you about school trips or visits
- Messages from teachers in the school diary
- Up-to-date information via the school website.

We use an online tracking system, Talaxy, where you can check rewards, sanctions, pupil timetables and attendance. Details for logging on will be sent to parents and carers. If you have any issues logging onto Talaxy, please contact the school.

ABSENCE/HOLIDAY REQUESTS

There are several occasions when you should contact school:

- If your child is absent due to illness etc. we ask you to phone the school office and let us know on their first day of absence before 9.00 am. **The telephone number is 01254 823362 ext 1 or 07787 820337**
- If you know the number of days your child is going to absent please indicate on your message otherwise ring in every alternate day and at the beginning of each new week.
- If you want to take your child out of school you must complete a holiday request form. Request forms are available from the school office or the school website (link to the page is [HERE](#)) forms must be submitted at least 2 weeks prior to the time requested. However, we actively discourage this in term time and failure to follow the school Attendance Policy (available on the school website) could result in prosecution. As of 1st September 2013, Headteachers, cannot authorise any leave of absence during term time unless they are satisfied that there are exceptional circumstances to warrant the granting of leave.

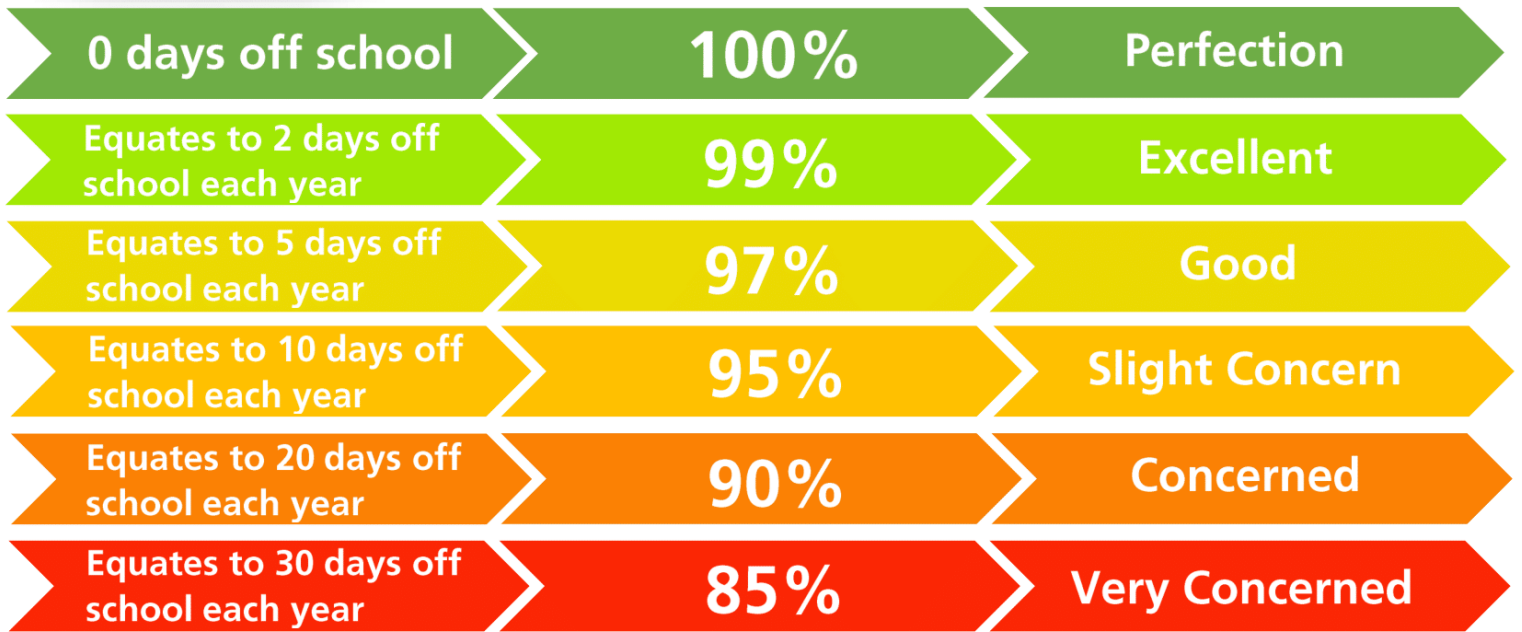
ANY CONCERNS

You may also want to contact school if any aspect of school life is causing concern for your child. Children do take a while to settle, get used to new teachers and make new friends. Be encouraging and reassuring and talk to your child about school. Offer positive advice and strategies to help them solve their own problems. However, you know your child best and if any aspect of school life is persistently causing difficulties or worries please phone school and speak to their Form Teacher or Year Leader. We also have a facility on the school website where pupils can report any concerns. This reporting feature alerts our pastoral team to investigate any issues and also support your child.

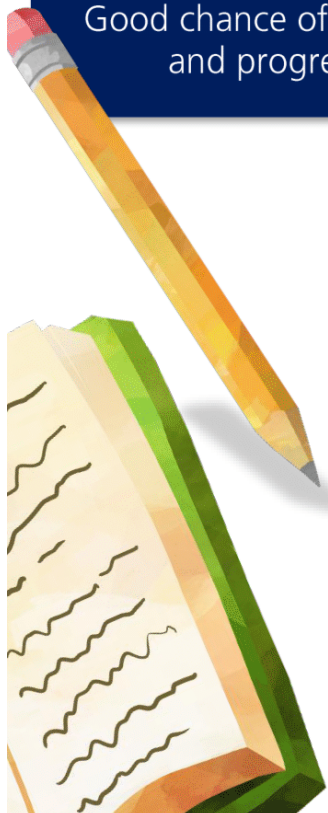

PROGRESS EVENINGS

The Progress Evening for Year 7 pupils is usually held in March when you are invited into school to discuss your child's progress. This evening runs from 4.00—7.00pm, during which time you should be able to see all your child's teachers to discuss their progress.

Should you not be able to attend Progress Evening, please inform your child's Year Leader as soon as possible. Subject teachers are not expected to contact parents/carers, in the event that you cannot attend.

THE LIBRARY

The library can be used by all pupils. Pupils are allowed to borrow resources for two weeks after which they must return or renew them. There are thousands of excellent books and magazines - both fact and fiction, many of which will be useful for school projects or presentations. There are also a variety of board games in the library which pupils can use at lunchtimes.

HOLY MASS AND ASSEMBLIES

Prayers are said every morning in registration and at the end of the last lesson of each day. Once a week the whole year group have an assembly in the hall led by the Year Leader.

Holy Mass is celebrated in the chapel at special times of the year. There are also whole school Masses at the end of each term. These are wonderful celebrations. There is also a Family Mass to be celebrated in September, when we particularly welcome our new intake and their families.



CHAPLAINCY

Chaplaincy is at the very heart of our school, making a daily contribution to the spiritual needs of staff and pupils. We have Gift Chaplains in all years who contribute to the faith life of our school. Throughout the year Chaplaincy activities take place. For example, at certain times throughout the year, pupils are invited to the Chapel to pray and reflect and this is followed by refreshments and time to chat.

Year 7 pupils may apply to become Chaplains in the Autumn Term.

CHARITY WORK

Each year group raises money for a particular charity. Charities are supported and families are welcome to suggest these to the Year Leader. Pupils are encouraged to take part in fundraising for good causes and collections for foodbanks etc.

LOCKERS

During the first few weeks of term pupils are offered the chance to rent a locker for the year. The charge is usually £5 and includes a lock and key. Pupils may find it useful for storing their P.E. kit or books etc. Pupils will be informed via Pupil Messages when lockers become available, they will then be directed to Pupil Services.

SCHOOL COUNCIL

The School Council is composed of pupils who have been elected to represent each year group. They meet once a term to discuss ideas to make the school a better place for pupils.

Elections for Year 7 pupil representatives are held in the Autumn Term.

SCHOOL DINNERS

Pupils may buy a hot or cold school dinner each day, or they may wish to bring their own packed lunch which they can also eat in the canteen. There is a good selection of foods available and children should be encouraged to eat healthily and to vary their choices.

The school operates a cashless system for the payment of school meals, where no cash is taken at the point of sale. Pupils enter money into a machine which recognises their finger print and credits them with the amount entered. The machine accepts £20, £10 & £5 notes and coinage down to 10p or parents can use the online payment link on the school website to top up their child's account and view purchase history. There is a daily spend limit of £5 set for all pupils. Pupils entitled to free school meals have the amount allocated for the meal entered into the system before each dinner break. Apart from being more convenient this system allows parents to see how their child is spending their dinner money and also reduces time spent queuing.

YEAR 11 MENTORS

Many Year 7 pupils will be given the name of a Year 11 pupil who will act as their mentor during the first year at St. Augustine's. These Year 7 pupils are identified after discussions with the Year 6 teachers and we hope that they will share their mentor with their friends. If your child does not have a mentor and you think it would be useful, your child should see their Form Teacher or you could phone school and speak to the Year Leader. The Year 11 mentors help to reassure the Year 7 pupils and provide a regular opportunity to talk to someone about any worries.

During the first term some Year 7 pupils are given mentors to help them with their reading. The older students meet the younger ones on a regular basis to hear them read and many pupils improve their reading age as a result of this extra support.



HOW CAN I HELP MY CHILD?

Moving from a small primary school to a large secondary cause many worries and anxieties, though in many cases these will disappear within a few weeks.

Reassure your child and remind them that other children will also be feeling anxious and that the teachers and other staff are there to help them. There are several ways that you can offer practical help:

- Encourage your child to get into a routine so that they are in good time for the bus. When they get home, maybe after a short rest, they should get their homework diaries out and do their homework. Keep a check that planners are being used correctly and please sign it at the end of each week.
- Help your child to become organised by providing them with somewhere (a drawer, box etc.) to keep all their school books and equipment. Encourage them to keep everything in this place and to pack their bags each evening to avoid rushing in the morning.
- Ensure that your child knows which school week it is.
- Make sure your child knows what you want him/her to do if something goes wrong e.g. if they miss the bus. Ensure that school have a contact number for you in case of emergencies and keep this updated. Telephone numbers can be updated via Talaxy.
- Check your child's pencil case and bag regularly and make sure they have everything they need for school. School holidays are good times for clearing out bags and getting reorganised.
- Put a spare timetable in a place where everyone can see it and clearly mark when your child will need extra equipment e.g. P.E. kit, technology apron, etc.
- Please keep school informed if your child has any medical problems or if the situation changes. This information should be initially given to school on one of the Pupil Registration Forms you have received. It is essential that this form is returned to school **BEFORE** the start of term so that medical information, contact numbers etc. can be entered onto computer before the children start school.
